What experience outside town government do you bring to the table?



Commissioners set county policy. Policies that relate to employees (i.e. work days/hours, holidays, paid-time-off, disciplinary policy) are all put into effect or tracked by the auditor's office.



Before Haley joined the team in 2019, Kaulig Racing recorded 22 top 10s and one top-five finish from 2016-2018. So far, Haley has earned three wins, 39 top 10s and 14 top-five finishes for Kaulig Racing in the No. 11 Chevrolet.

Haley also joined the likes of Dale Earnhardt and Dale

Earnhardt Jr. as a driver to win three superspeedway races in a row following his win at Talladega Superspeedway earlier this month. The 21-year-old has since become one of 34 drivers, and the second youngest, to record a win in all three of NASCAR's top-tier series.
